	On or around 4 July 1998 [REDACTED] was driving [REDACTED] on a tiller when, close to the entrance to [REDACTED], the three men were stopped by [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] who were wearing black uniforms and carried automatic rifles and magnum revolvers. ³ A third person

in black uniform arrived and stood in front of [REDACTED] with a rocket launcher which he pointed at them. ⁴
The three men were put in the tiller's trailer and [REDACTED] pointed his weapon at them. ⁵ As they were being driven away, [REDACTED] appeared in a vehicle and the tiller stopped as they turned towards [REDACTED]. ⁶ A shot was fired at [REDACTED]. ⁷
[REDACTED] were then pushed into the trunk of [REDACTED]'s vehicle and taken to a house in Budakovë/Budakovo. ⁸ Their shoelaces and t-shirts were removed, their hands were tied, they were blindfolded and beaten. ⁹
[REDACTED], still blindfolded, was thrown down the stairs leading to a bunker located behind the house they had arrived at. ¹⁰ His blindfold slipped and a person [REDACTED] kicked him on his head from behind. ¹¹ A person wearing camouflage uniform with KLA insignia on his shoulder, a red beret, and armed with a pistol, questioned [REDACTED] in the bunker and told him they had
killed his father. ¹² [REDACTED] was interrogated next, and then [REDACTED]. ¹³ [REDACTED], blindfolded and with hands tied, were taken to a barn, put into a vehicle with [REDACTED] and others, and taken to a house owned by [REDACTED] located about 2.5

kilometres away from the house they were initially taken to in Budakovë/Budakovo. ¹⁴ Two persons
led them to a basement and threw them in. ¹⁵ One person guarded them inside the basement, and
another outside. ¹⁶ A little after they were taken there, persons arrived and asked that the three men
be released; the guards told these persons to leave if they did not want to be detained with the three
men. ¹⁷ A group of people, including some in uniform and some women, arrived; the three men were
put in a circle in the basement and beaten. ¹⁸
After the beating, two Albanian detainees, [REDACTED], were brought into the basement. ¹⁹ They
both showed signs of having been beaten. ²⁰ The two men were in the basement for about two hours
and then taken away. ²¹

On 5 July 1998, [REDACTED] and one other person put [REDACTED] in a vehicle and told them
they were taking them to be shot. ²² They made a few stops and [REDACTED] and the other person,
as well as others at checkpoints, discussed whether they would shoot the three men. ²³ They arrived
in [REDACTED], took the three men out of the vehicle, lined them up, ordered them to turn around
and then told them they were going home and untied them. $^{\rm 24}$ They did not allow the three men to

[REDACTED] On or around 17 August 1998, ²⁶ [REDACTED] was taken from the yard of his house [REDACTED], put into the trunk of a car, and driven to the house of [REDACTED] in Budakovë/Budakovo, where he was put in a room. ²⁷ The house was about 1 kilometre from the KLA headquarters in
Budakovë/Budakovo. ²⁸ On or around 17 August 1998, ²⁹ pursuant to an order from [REDACTED], ³⁰ [REDACTED], were
arrested by KLA member [REDACTED] at a check-point in or around [REDACTED]and taken to the house of [REDACTED] in Budakovë/Budakovo where they were held in separate rooms. ³¹
On or around 17 August 1998,32 [REDACTED] was driving from [REDACTED] towards
Budakovë/Budakovo when he was stopped in [REDACTED] by [REDACTED], dressed in a black
uniform, with two other persons in green camouflage uniform. ³³ Their uniforms had KLA insignia

and they were armed. ³⁴ [REDACTED] arrested [REDACTED] ³⁵ pursuant to an order from
[REDACTED].36 [REDACTED]'s hands were tied and he was put in a vehicle driven by
[REDACTED] who told [REDACTED] that he was under arrest but did not tell him why.37
[REDACTED] was detained in an empty room constantly guarded by soldiers adjacent to the room
[REDACTED] was detained in. ³⁸
On the same day [REDACTED] was arrested and detained in a house in Budakovë/Budakovo, he
was beaten and blindfolded there. ³⁹ KLA members took [REDACTED] to a room in the same house
where he met [REDACTED] in the presence of two or three soldiers in camouflage uniforms, one
of whom was [REDACTED].40 [REDACTED] spoke about [REDACTED]; he also asked
[REDACTED] if she had been beaten and she told him she was beaten a little.41 [REDACTED]
confirmed that [REDACTED] was also being detained in the same location, and [REDACTED]
heard [REDACTED]'s voice there.42 This was the last time [REDACTED] ever spoke to
[REDACTED].43 [REDACTED] was then made to write his name on a paper, and was released as it
was getting dark, being told to go home and stay under house arrest there.44 At no point did anyone

accuse [REDACTED] of committing any crimes, inform him he had been found guilty of anything, or that he was being sentenced. ⁴⁵
With a guard at the door, [REDACTED] spoke to [REDACTED] separately about whether they were involved in spying against the KLA and serving Serbian forces. ⁴⁶ After having spoken to the two women, [REDACTED] concluded they were prostitutes and proposed to [REDACTED] to release them or send them to the Brigade. ⁴⁷ [REDACTED] also questioned [REDACTED] in Budakovë/Budakovo while [REDACTED] was blindfolded, asking him about [REDACTED] and whether he worked for the Serbs or had connections to the police. ⁴⁸ While in detention in Budakovë/Budakovo, [REDACTED] was also verbally abused and his jaw was injured after being punched. ⁴⁹
[REDACTED] issued a written order stating that [REDACTED] should be transferred from Budakovë/Budakovo to Brigade 123, ⁵⁰ which, at the time was located in Semetishtë/Semetište. ⁵¹ After about three days in detention in Budakovë/Budakovo, ⁵² [REDACTED] were taken to a vehicle by [REDACTED]'s house and sat in the back seat with KLA member [REDACTED] in the driver's seat and [REDACTED] in the passenger's seat. ⁵³ From Budakovë/Budakovo, they took the road to Semetishtë/Semetište, and at the entrance to Semetishtë/Semetište, they were handed over to KLA member [REDACTED]. ⁵⁴

[REDACTED] was taken to an uninhabited house in Semetishtë/Semetište and put in a room in a
basement there. ⁵⁵ The room was empty; there was no bed or chair, and the door was kept locked. ⁵⁶
After [REDACTED] was put in the basement, while blindfolded, he was taken to an office where
he was questioned about [REDACTED] and his involvement with the Serbian police. ⁵⁷ He was then
taken back to the room in the basement where he was held for two days before being told to go
home. ⁵⁸ [REDACTED] signed a document noting he took back possession of his vehicle and drove
himself to [REDACTED]. ⁵⁹ He was not accused of having committed any crime at any time during
his detention. ⁶⁰
[REDACTED]
Around September 1998, ⁶¹ [REDACTED] was arrested [REDACTED]. ⁶² He was detained for several days in a house in Budakovë/Budakovo [REDACTED]. ⁶³ While detained in Budakovë/Budakovo,
[REDACTED] was accused of being a spy and physically mistreated. ⁶⁴ A detainee [REDACTED]
was detained in Budakovë/Budakovo at the same time as [REDACTED].65 [REDACTED] was
released shortly before [REDACTED] was transferred by the KLA to serve in
Budakovë/Budakovo. ⁶⁶

	On or around 28 or 29 April 1999, KLA member [REDACTED] and another soldier arrived at [REDACTED]'s house in [REDACTED] where [REDACTED] was staying, and told [REDACTED] that they were there because they needed to take [REDACTED] with them and ask him some questions. ⁶⁷ [REDACTED] put [REDACTED] in a vehicle, tied his hands with some form of rope and they headed in the direction of Budakovë/Budakovo. ⁶⁸

[REDACTED] to a house about 500 metres away from the headquarters where they spent around
20 minutes; the Military Police were staying in the oda of this house, and there [REDACTED] told
KLA member [REDACTED] to go with him. ⁷⁶ [REDACTED] and another soldier took [REDACTED]
to the basement of a house in the Palush neighbourhood about 1 kilometre away. ⁷⁷ The basement
had been burned down and the room he was put in had a very small window and an iron door. ⁷⁸
In the basement, [REDACTED] and another soldier started to beat and insult [REDACTED] while
his hands were tied, seriously injuring him. ⁷⁹ After the beating, his feet were also tied together, and
they put a rope around his neck and tied that rope to a piece of metal which was on the ground. ⁸⁰
[REDACTED] questioned [REDACTED] about [REDACTED] and accused him of working and
collaborating with Serbs; [REDACTED] denied this. ⁸¹ At some point after he was tied to the ground,
another person entered with a sniper rifle and addressed [REDACTED], asking him if he wanted to execute [REDACTED] immediately. ⁸²
After about an hour, [REDACTED] regained consciousness, managed to untie himself and, on the
evening of the same day he was arrested, escaped in the direction of [REDACTED], reaching
[REDACTED] the following day. ⁸³
At no time was [REDACTED] told why he was arrested, transferred or detained, accused of committing any crimes, or taken before a judge or court. ⁸⁴

After this beating, two Albanian detainees, [REDACTED] were brought into the basement. ¹¹⁷ The
two men said they were considered to be working for the Serbian police, that they were considered
traitors, and that the younger man was tortured with hot water. ¹¹⁸ The younger Albanian man had
injuries on his legs and feet that looked like boiling water had been poured over them and he was
unable to walk; [REDACTED]'s face appeared to have been beaten and was covered in blood. ¹¹⁹ The
two men were in the basement for about two hours and then taken away. ¹²⁰
On 5 July 1998, [REDACTED] and one other person arrived, put [REDACTED] in a vehicle, and
told them they were taking them to be shot. ¹²¹ Prior to releasing the detainees, they made a few
stops and [REDACTED] and the other person, as well as others at checkpoints, discussed whether
they would shoot the three men. ¹²²
During the incident [REDACTED] suffered injuries to his throat and six of his ribs were broken;

happening to him was his punishment for working with the Serbs. ¹²⁵ When he was released, he was

arrested.132 The room he was detained in in Budakovë/Budakovo was empty and constantly
guarded by soldiers. ¹³³ While blindfolded, he was questioned about [REDACTED] and whether he
worked for the Serbs or had connections to the police. ¹³⁴ He was verbally abused and his jaw was
injured after being punched. ¹³⁵ [REDACTED] slept on a very thin blanket on the concrete ground
in Budakovë/Budakovo, which was very uncomfortable and caused him pain. ¹³⁶ In

and the door was kept locked.137 [REDACTED] also slept on concrete in Semetishtë/Semetište,

Deutschemarks and 75 Yugoslav dinars; these were never returned to him. ¹⁴⁹ [REDACTED]
threatened to kill [REDACTED] and told him that he had killed [REDACTED]. ¹⁵⁰
When they got out of the vehicle, [REDACTED] cocked a 9-millimetre revolver, loaded it, and put
it in [REDACTED]'s mouth. ¹⁵¹ [REDACTED] took [REDACTED] to KLA headquarters in
