I. INTRODUCTION

1. Pursuant to Trial Panel I's ('the Panel') decision on the Specialist Prosecutor's request for segregation and other measures ('Segregation Decision'),¹ the Registrar submits the following report on the enforcement of the segregation regime and the system of communications restrictions and their effects on the Accused.

II. PROCEDURAL HISTORY

- 1. On 19 August 2021, Mr Salih Mustafa ('Mr Mustafa') was segregated pursuant to the Segregation Decision.²
- 2. The conditions set out in the Segregation Decision were further clarified and amended through the Panel's decisions on 1 and 10 September 2021.³

III. SUBMISSIONS

3. In the Segregation Decision, the Registrar is ordered to submit a consolidated report every 30 days, as of 19 August 2021, or at any time earlier, if deemed necessary,⁴ on the enforcement of the segregation regime, restrictions on communications, and their eventual effects on the Accused, to the Panel, the Parties and Victims' Counsel.⁵

- 4. The First Monthly Registry Report on Segregation of the Accused was filed on 20 September 2021.⁶
- 5. The Second Monthly Registry Report on Segregation of the Accused was filed on 20 October 2021.⁷
- 6. On 11 November 2021, the Panel issued an oral order requesting that the Third Monthly Registry Report on Segregation of the Accused be filed in advance of the deadline, by 16 November 2021.8
- 7. The Registrar presents the third report on the implementation of the segregation regime (A), telephone calls (B), and visits (C) of the Accused, as well as the impact of such measures on him (D) since 20 October 2021 ('reporting period').

A. SEGREGATION REGIME

- 8. Mr Mustafa has been segregated in [REDACTED] the Detention Facilities since 19 August 2021, and he has had no contact with any other Detainees in the Detention Facilities. No breach of the segregation regime has been reported or noticed.
- 9. During his segregation, Mr Mustafa has had access to the facilities and services described in paragraphs 17-18 and 20-21 of the Registry Submissions,⁹ including access to privileged in-person visits, video visits, and telephone calls with Counsel and members of Counsel's Team.

11. Special attention continues to be paid to ensuring that Mr Mustafa has an opportunity for meaningful human contact for more than two hours per day through

a combination of different avenues and activities.¹⁰

12. During the reporting period, Mr Mustafa has been visited daily by the Chief Detention Officer or a Detention Officer acting on his behalf, and he has also been

visited by the Medical Officer, as described in paragraphs 24-25 of the Registry

Submissions.¹¹

13. In addition, during the reporting period, Detention Officers and other Detention

Management Unit ('DMU') staff have proactively engaged with the Accused.

14. On average, Mr Mustafa's daily interactions with Detention Officers and other

staff has ranged from [REDACTED]. The durations of those interactions were

influenced by the schedule of proceedings. This is in addition to Mr Mustafa's

telephone calls and visits [REDACTED].

B. TELEPHONE CALLS

15. Mr Mustafa is currently permitted one (1) phone call per day with authorised

family members, under active monitoring, for a maximum duration of 30 minutes per

call. Calls are authorised from Monday to Friday during working hours, until 20:00

during hearing days, and between 10:00 and 17:00 on Saturdays and Sundays.¹² These

restrictions are not applicable to privileged calls with Defence Counsel and his team

or certain categories of special visitors.¹³

16. [REDACTED], Mr Mustafa has had [REDACTED] telephone calls [REDACTED]

during the reporting period, which were actively monitored in accordance with the

Segregation Decision.¹⁴ No unauthorised disclosure was identified during the calls.

C. VISITS

18. In accordance with the Decision, Mr Mustafa is currently permitted a maximum

of 10 visits per month, whether in-person or via video or a combination thereof, under

active monitoring (in addition to the recording of all visits). 15 During hearing days,

visits are authorised until 20:00.16

21. [REDACTED] visits were actively monitored and recorded. No unauthorised
