- the question, or tell them you don't understand and they will attempt 6
- 7 to clarify.

- Good morning, Mr. Mustafa. You've mentioned Adem Demaci a 23
- number of times in your testimony. What was his official position in 24
- the KLA? 25

- He was director of the political directorate of the Kosovo 1
- Liberation Army. But above all, he was a leader of Albanians -- of
- Albanian people for many years while we were under Serbian
- 4 occupation.
- Are you referring there to the overall political directorate of 5
- the KLA or are you referring to a specific political office? 6
- For me, this was the biggest political directorate of the KLA. 7
- So I understand that for you it was the most important one, but 8 Ο.
- which one was it? 9
- For me, the office led by Adem Demaci in Prishtine was the most 10
- important one. 11
- So it was the KLA political office in Prishtine that he led; is 12
- that correct? 13
- 14 Correct.
- You've just indicated he was someone that was very important to 15
- you. Did you know him well? 16
- Yes, I did know him well. 17 Α.
- 18 And clearly he had influence over you on political matters; is
- that right? 19
- Yes, in general I was very cooperative with Teacher Demaci. 20
- Would you say more so over you than other members of the KLA? 21 Q.
- He was in general for the Albanian people and the KLA in its 22
- entirety, but to me, in my honest view, I -- I recognise he was even 23
- more special to me. 24
- 25 MS. LAWSON: Your Honour, I'd like to go into private session

- 7 MS. LAWSON: Thank you.
- Can we bring up document SITF00243091, and the English is the 8
- same with ET at the end. It is one we looked at yesterday, and we'll 9
- just call it up briefly again today. It should not be broadcast. 10
- And if we can please go to page 243132 in each. 11
- 12 Mr. Mustafa, can you please look at entries number 14 and 15.
- Under the release column, it says: 13
- 14 "He has been engaged in U/55."
- What does "U/55" refer to? 15
- Ulpiana 55. Α. 16
- Thank you. 17 Q.
- 18 MS. LAWSON: We can remove the document again.
- Yesterday, when we were discussing the extent to which 19
- Nazif Mehmeti reported or provided information on detainees to the 20
- zone headquarters, you stated it happened very rarely. And that's 21

MS. LAWSON: This was before the court in 2003. And the

reference is SPOE00119323 at 119331. That's the English. And the

- 3 Albanian is SPOE00119334 at 9343.
- 4 Q. And I'm going to read a portion of that to you.
- 5 "I kept myself informed about detainees but I was not always
- informed about everything. There were peoples whose job it was to do
- 7 that. Reports from all units were sent to the chief of staff, it
- 8 might be possible [that] 1, 2 or 3 detainees might be brought in and
- 9 I would not be brought in and some would be there for different acts.
- I asked for and received a report from Nazif Mehmeti directly. He
- was under obligation to report to the Headquarters any minor change.
- I believe there was some written instruction about that."
- Is that correct, that he was in fact under an obligation to
- report to the headquarters when making changes?
- 15 A. Your frequent questions now, but also the questions at the time
- by the prosecutor, seem to exaggerate this matter. It was not as
- important as we want to portray it. However, I stand by what I've
- always said. By insisting on the same question, we're just
- 19 exaggerating things. As was the case with the administrative
- documents we discussed earlier of which I had no knowledge, but in
- regards to which I have no reason reject them, so I accept what I
- have said here.
- Q. Thank you. So I understand from that that the issue of
- detentions is being exaggerated but that you accept the information
- provided in this statement that I just read to you; is that right?

I accept that Nazif Mehmeti was in charge, did his job 1

- honourably, and dealt with the detainees. And whenever this was
- necessary, he came and reported to me and to the zone headquarters of

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- 4 the operative zone with respect to the works being conducted or
- carried out there. 5
- And he was, in fact, obliged to do so; isn't that right? 6
- 7 Certainly.
- Did relatives ever come to the Llap zone command looking to 8 Ο.
- locate the bodies of persons who had been detained there? 9
- I don't remember specifically. However, they were allowed to 10
- come and visit their relatives. 11
- So I'm going to change topic. Yesterday, we were discussing 12
- visits by General Staff members to the Llap zone in the second half 13
- 14 of 1998, and specifically October was my question. I indicated then
- that there was a document I wanted to show which we would come back 15
- to, and we'll do that now. 16
- MS. LAWSON: Can we please call up Mr. Zhitia's book. The 17
- reference is SPOE00055678 at page 55838. And the English is 18
- SPOE00055699-ET Revised 1 at page 55838. 19
- So it's referring here to a visit on 27th and 28th October 1998 20
- by Hashim Thaci, Jakup Krasniqi, Bislim Zyrapi, and Rame Buja. Do 21
- you now remember that visit? 22
- I know a visit took place. However, I'm not certain about the 23
- details as explained in the book. I know that Mr. Zhitia wrote a 24
- 25 good book and I complimented him on that. However, I cannot remember

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- details as described in the book, but I have no reason to deny it
- either.
- Q. Where did they come to? Was it the newly established
- 4 headquarters in Llapashtice?
- 5 A. It is true that I do not remember. This was a time of
- 6 exceptional and extraordinary times and commitment for each of us,
- and I don't remember. However, the records used as a source by
- 8 Mr. Zhitia could be accurate.
- 9 MS. LAWSON: And given that the witness indicated he didn't
- 10 remember, I'd like to refer to a prior statement, Your Honour.
- PRESIDING JUDGE SMITH: [Microphone not activated].
- 12 It's granted. Thank you.
- MS. LAWSON: The reference is Part 5, page 10 in English. And
- it's Part 5, page 11 in Albanian.
- Q. And I'll just read a small portion for now on this precise
- 16 point:
- "So on that date, end of October, those four. And when they
- actually came to the zone, that would have mean they would have come
- to what, to your headquarters in Llapashtice?"
- That was the question.
- Your answer:
- 22 "Yes."
- "Q. Your newly established headquarters?
- 24 "A. Yes."
- Does that assist?

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- 1 A. I said it also in relation to the book of Zhitia that this could
- 2 be the case, but I do not remember the specifics. I know they came
- for a visit. I cannot recall the details now.
- Q. Did they have the opportunity to meet with all of your command
- 5 staff?
- A. I don't think the members of the General Staff requested to meet
- with all commanders, but we certainly have introduced those they
- 8 asked to meet with.
- 9 Q. And where did the delegation eat and sleep?
- 10 A. In those houses where we stayed.
- 11 Q. So in the same facilities that you were using in Llapashtice; is
- 12 that correct?
- 13 A. I am not certain it was the same house, but somewhere in the
- area, in one of the houses in the village. You could use my prior
- statements prior to this. I stand by those. I have no reason to
- 16 hide or conceal the visit from the General Staff.
- 17 Q. Yes.
- MS. LAWSON: And, Your Honour, I will please put a small portion
- 19 of a prior statement.
- 20 PRESIDING JUDGE SMITH: All right.
- MS. LAWSON: It's Part 5, page 17 in English. And Part 5, page
- 22 19 in Albanian.
- 23 Q. The question was:
- "All right. Well, did you introduce them to your senior
- 25 commanders?

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- "A. Yes. 1
- For example, Latif Gashi.
- "A. Yeah, all of my staff, including brigade commanders, had 3
- the opportunity to meet them and talk with them." 4
- "So I can't tell you specifically, but I believe that everybody 5
- met them, because they had the opportunity to meet them because they 6
- were having their meals at the same place that we had our meals." 7
- Does that remind you? 8
- I see no -- nothing different from what I said earlier. I 9
- cannot remember the details, but they would have been able to meet 10
- the staff members. They were in my presence, too. I mean, the 11
- members from my staff HQ. 12
- What was discussed in your meetings with them on that visit? 13
- 14 Generally, the organisation of the war and how to advance it
- further. It was the time when -- of greater cooperation with an 15
- array of international organisations, and, therefore, that was an 16
- opportunity for us to advance our goals further. 17
- Did it include both combat and political matters, the 18
- discussions? 19
- The issue of preparations of the war effort on the part of the 20
- units but also political matters, too. 21
- Did they provide instruction on anything in particular during 22
- that visit? 23
- There must have certainly been an exchange on both sides, but I 24
- cannot recall anything in -- in particular. It was generally to do 25

- with the conduct of the war and how it was proceeding. A number of 1
- issues would have been discussed.
- How about civil administration structures?
- It would have been possible to discuss that as well. The effort
- was to expand the Kosovo Liberation Army across the territory, and 5
- that was being done through the Directorate for Civil Organisation. 6
- And were there people selected during that visit to have 7
- responsibility for various civil administration matters? 8
- I don't think there were appointments made in the course of the 9
- visit. However, we were able to appoint people afterwards. People 10
- who were never able to complete the set of tasks assigned to them 11
- because the offensives made that impossible. 12
- Did those people subsequently assume certain positions after the 13
- 14 war?
- Some of them, yes. 15
- What positions? Q. 16
- 17 Α. Mayors.
- So mayors of municipalities; is that right? 18
- Α. Yes. 19
- And when approximately did they take up those functions? Q. 20
- By the end of the war. 21 Α.
- Can you give me an approximate date of what you're referring to? Q. 22
- Immediately after the entry of KFOR, the administration, at 23
- KFOR's request, pleaded with us to appoint people who would be 24
- responsible for the municipalities -- municipalities, which we did. 25

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Witness: W04746 (Resumed) (Open Session) Examination by Ms. Lawson (Continued)

- At that time, the provisional government had also become operational, 1
- and so the heads of the municipalities in Prishtine and Podujeve were
- appointed. I had an influence, so the people whose names I submitted
- were the ones who later became the mayors.
- And did they fall under the provisional government structure 5
- then?
- To be frank with you, I cannot recall the organisational chart 7
- at this point in time, but I know that they served as mayors for five 8
- or six months. The people that we appointed, that is. The people 9
- that we appointed in cooperation with all the relevant stakeholders 10
- or actors of the time. 11
- So this would be June 1998. And on the General Staff visit, did 12
- they provide you instruction on how to select those people and an 13
- 14 idea of how to govern the municipalities after the war and also
- during the war? 15
- Madam Prosecutor, we focused our conversations for the wartimes 16
- so that we could expand even further. I don't think that the 17
- General Staff or anyone else would have conceived at the time that we 18
- would be liberated so speedily or what would happen after the war. 19
- However, given that I had assigned tasks to people in the course 20
- of the war because I respected them, I tried to -- to -- I tried so 21
- much for them not to be bypassed but to be involved in politics in 22
- the administrative capacities after the war. 23
- There was a cease-fire that had just come into operation at that 24
- time, though, wasn't there? 25

- Α. Yes. 1
- MS. LAWSON: And I'd like to put a short portion of a prior
- statement to the witness, please. 3
- PRESIDING JUDGE SMITH: All right. Go ahead.
- MS. LAWSON: It's Part 5, page 15 in the English. And Part 5, 5
- page 16 in the Albanian.
- 7 And you said:
- "So the same people that we appointed were the mayors after the 8
- war. I think that the General Staff -- it was the reason the 9
- General Staff came to visit us at that time, to instruct us how to 10
- select people. And in order to have an idea how to govern the 11
- municipalities after the war and also during the war." 12
- Do you accept that, Mr. Mustafa? 13
- 14 Madam Prosecutor, that is exactly what occurred and how I
- described it. However, this was not meant to be as influential in 15
- the Llap operational zone as we are making it seem now. However, we 16
- did discuss the organisation of -- of -- the political and civilian 17
- administration in as good a manner as possible. And we discussed --18
- we discussed the names. We discussed names, but I don't think that 19
- the General Staff at the time were aware of those names. This became 20
- known later with the end of the war when they started exercising 21
- their functions as mayors of those municipalities. 22
- During that visit by the General Staff members, were there also 23
- matters that you wanted to raise with the General Staff? 24
- 25 A. Yes, it was -- it was a two-way conversation. It was to do

- with the war effort, the organisation. We talked about everything,
- the details of which I cannot recall at this point.
- What type of issues did you want to raise specifically with them
- for discussion?
- On the conduct of the war. Issues to do with the organisation. 5
- I informed them that I had a specific type of organisation, that I
- had involved political subject in the effort. It was a special kind 7
- of organisation. I was -- because I was in close proximity to 8
- Prishtine, I had the benefit of the advice from Demaci and his 9
- advisers. And so we -- we had this kind of cooperation given the 10
- area we lived in. 11
- And did the organisational matters that you wanted to raise, or 12
- that you did raise, include, for example, representation of the zones 13
- 14 in the General Staff?
- It may have been one of the issues discussed, but I cannot 15
- recall it in particular. 16
- Did it include making public the composition of the 17
- General Staff? 18
- At this point, I'm not certain about it. 19
- Regulation of finances, was that an issue of concern to you? Q. 20
- The issues you mention were of a permanent nature, and we 21
- discussed them every time we met. We spoke about logistical issues 22
- and the -- and the -- all the issues that had to do with the conduct 23
- of the war. However, I do not remember the details of what was 24
- 25 discussed in this particular meeting.

- MS. LAWSON: I'd like to bring up a document, please. It's 1
- P00181, and the English is the same with ET at the end. And we can
- please go to page SPOE00226666.
- Mr. Mustafa, do you see at the top of the page it gives a date
- of 27 October 1998, and it's headed: Meeting with the Llap zone 5
- operational staff. Do you see that? 6
- Yes, I do. 7
- And there's your name and there are notes of some matters that 8 Ο.
- you'd raised as needing discussion. Are those -- those are the type 9
- of matters that we've just discussed that you would -- that would 10
- come up at each meeting; isn't that right? 11
- I would be reluctant to comment on an unclear piece of 12
- handwriting whose origin is unknown, even though this -- I see 13
- 14 nothing wrong in it. However, I'm reluctant to comment on -- on
- someone else's work. 15
- I understand. So starting with some of the delegation members. 16
- MS. LAWSON: And we can take the document down. Thank you. 17
- What was Hashim Thaci's position in the General Staff at that 18
- time? 19
- I don't think I was aware of Hashim Thaci's position at that 20
- time. He -- Hashim Thaci, however, had a number of tasks during and 21
- after the war, and I may make a mistake here and there. However, at 22
- the time I knew him as a soldier of the Kosovo Liberation Army, 23
- someone of significance in our fight for freedom. However, at the 24
- time that we are referring to in October, I don't think that I was 25

- aware what position he held. 1
- Did you consider him to be an important person within the KLA?
- People who visited were -- were often thought of as important
- people within the Kosovo Liberation Army, and we -- we had 4
- conversations with them. So everybody who came from Drenica, 5
- Dukaqjini, Shala -- or everyone who came could not have had a 6
- conversation with me had he or she not been of significance. So from 7
- this point you can infer that I thought of them as being significant. 8
- He came in the company of the chief of staff and, therefore, he was 9
- a -- an important figure. 10
- Was there anything else that gave you the impression he was 11
- important? 12
- I can't recall any -- any details. 13
- 14 How did the other members of the delegation treat him or respond
- to him? 15
- At that time, I did not note anything in particular. It was too 16
- early to ask questions about people's political stature. 17
- 18 MS. LAWSON: And, Your Honour, I'd like to put a prior statement
- to the witness, please. 19
- PRESIDING JUDGE SMITH: All right. 20
- MS. LAWSON: It's Part 5, pages 12 going on to 13 in the 21
- English. And Part 5, pages 13 going on to 14 in the Albanian. 22
- And to provide the full context, I'll start reading slightly 23
- earlier in the transcript, which is entirely consistent with what you 24
- have said in your testimony, and then get to the relevant point. You 25

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said: 1

- "A. So this is about time when Hashim Thaci begins to emerge as
- a very important figure in KLA. But for us, the recognisable persons 3
- in here and in that hierarchy were Jakup Krasniqi and Bislim Zyrapi.
- "Q. Did you know what -- at the time that they visited at the 5
- end of October, what their positions were? So Hashim Thaci, what did 6
- you understand his position was? 7
- "A. I know it may sound interesting to you, but I don't think 8
- he himself knew at the time what his position. What I knew was that 9
- he was important. With the benefit of hindsight, I know even more 10
- about it. But at that time, I can assure you that I didn't ... all I 11
- know is that they showed deference to him, and also I showed respect 12
- for him. 13
- When you say 'they showed deference,' you mean the other 14
- three delegates who were with him? 15
- "A. Since they were showing respects towards him, I also paid 16
- my respects to him. 17
- "Q. Right. So Jakup Krasniqi, Bislim Zyrapi, and Rame Buja, 18
- just so we're clear, were treating Hashim Thaci with a level of 19
- respect? 20
- "A. I'm saying -- yes, I'm confirming it. And I can also say 21
- that at the time, I thought that he was the one writing communiqués. 22
- But now -- of course, now with later on I came to know more. But at 23
- that time, I thought that he was a clever man who used to write 24
- communiqués. And even himself, he was not interested in portraying 25

- himself as somebody important." 1
- Were the other members of the delegation treating Hashim Thaci
- with deference?
- As I said at the time, yes. And I reaffirm it today.
- Jakup Krasniqi, what was his role in the General Staff? 5 Q.
- He was the Kosovo Liberation Army spokesman. Α.
- Was there a time when he also occupied a second role? 7
- I know I have seen documents that describe him as a deputy. 8
- However, as far as we're concerned, he was always known as a 9
- spokesman of the Kosovo Liberation Army. However, I am aware that 10
- records have emerged that suggest that he was -- he has also been a 11
- 12 deputy.
- And when I mentioned Hashim Thaci as writing communiqués, what I 13
- 14 was referring to was the fact that he was communicating with the
- public. At the time, I thought of him as somebody in charge of 15
- public communications, communicating with the mass media. 16
- And when you say "deputy," do you mean deputy commander of the 17
- overall KLA? 18
- Yes, that's what some records that I saw suggest. I -- through 19
- trials and other sources after the war, that's what I saw. However, 20
- I am saying here that at the time I knew Jakup Krasniqi as a 21
- spokesman of the Kosovo Liberation Army. He was a significant figure 22
- who I respected and I continue to respect. 23
- Rexhep Selimi, what was his -- he was another delegation member. 24
- What was his position in the General Staff -- or, sorry, he wasn't on 25

Page 5630 Examination by Ms. Lawson (Continued)

- this occasion. What was his position in the General Staff? 1
- He served as inspector in the Kosovo Liberation Army and a staff
- member too.
- So general inspector; is that correct?
- Yes, general inspector in the Kosovo Liberation Army. 5
- And also a member of the zone command -- apologies,
- General Staff. Correct? Also a staff member, you said? Also a 7
- member of the General Staff? 8
- Yes, I think so. 9
- Did you consider him to be an important figure in the KLA? 10
- Yes. Ever since I first met Rexhep Selimi, I respected him as a 11
- 12 brave soldier and a significant figure in the war effort. He was
- persistent in the best organisation of the KLA just like the rest of 13
- 14
- What was Kadri Veseli's role in the General Staff? 15
- I knew and respected him. I knew he was in the General Staff. 16
- However, I know him a lot less than the others we've been discussing 17
- 18 here. I'm not sure that I was aware of his -- of what position he
- held during the war. After the war, a lot has emerged that may 19
- affect the way I -- I think now of what I thought at the time. I 20
- don't think we've ever discussed his position, so there's nothing to 21
- 22 say.
- PRESIDING JUDGE SMITH: Ms. Lawson, there's a technical issue 23
- going on in the courtroom. We need to take a few minutes' break so 24
- that that can be sorted out. So we'll be adjourned for a matter of 25

- Were you yourself a member of the General Staff at any point in 17

- Yes, Ms. Prosecutor, I was told that I was. For a time. 19 Α.
- When was that? Q. 20
- Α. It could be February. 21
- Approximately how long were you a member of the General Staff? Q. 22
- Perhaps two weeks. And then I returned to my zone, to my 23
- region. 24
- Who told you that you were a member of the General Staff? 25

- the General Staff? 6
- The chief of staff. 7

It did treat this via a communiqué aimed for the public, but not

with the zone commanders like us.

These should be taken as a propaganda means, Madam Prosecutor. 5

This does not mean that these issues were discussed within the forums

of the Kosovo Liberation Army. Or, rather, that maybe somebody --7

somebody would have spoken about this, but nobody paid any heed. 8

Commanders like us came from the ground. We saw people who were 9

being burned alive, friends -- and friends who had died all around

us. And we were -- did not have at the time the luxury of talking 11

about this kind of stuff. We can discuss this now but not then.

MR. EMMERSON: Again, I promise this is the last time, and 13

certainly on this issue. It's been extremely helpful to have that

clarification explored. At page 36, line 21, the witness emphasised

that the term "special forces" related to enemy forces. And in this 16

passage that he's been taken to as well there is a reference to

18 special forces being part of the enemy forces.

- a matter of fact, I don't remember this one either, but I am ready to 13

- Propaganda material, perhaps. I wouldn't be able to tell now 7
- exactly. I would probably need to see the entire material to give a 8

- MS. LAWSON: We can turn to page U002-2811. 11
- There's a heading, "Special warfare during the Serbian 12

- I had no knowledge, but I cannot exclude it. I -- I had no 7

- it having happened after people were arrested by the KLA? 11
- 12 There was no need for me to express any concern whatsoever on

- And that he reported directly to the zone command, that is, to 13
- 14 yourself, your deputy and the chief of staff; correct?

- You received information on the circumstances of some of the 12
- arrests, didn't you? 13
- 14 Yes.
- And, for example, you know that some people resisted, don't you? 15
- Yes, as I was able to explain yesterday. 16
- And you accept that those people could have been beaten, don't 17
- you? 18
- I state that given -- at the point where they were under the 19
- control of my soldiers, they could have been beaten up to the point 20
- where their resistance had been defeated. 21
- MS. LAWSON: I'd like to call up a prior statement, please. 22
- It's SPOE00087274 at page 87290. 23

- Someone could have been tortured up until the point when they were 1
- detained, at the time when they would arrive at the detention

- MS. LAWSON: And if we go to the SPO transcript, Part 11, 5
- page 6, and Part 11 Revised, page 7 in the Albanian. 6
- 7 Q. You say:
- "It's not that it [was] allowed. But we had cases where people 8
- resisted, and it's possible that they were beaten up until they were 9
- brought to the detention centre where Nazif Mehmeti was. And from 10
- the moment that they entered the detention centre, there was never 11
- any complaint that anybody was beat." 12
- Were there complaints of beatings from before people entered the 13
- 14 detention centre?
- No, I did not receive any complaints at the time. I spoke here 15

- alleging that this witness assassinated anybody; and if so, on what 6

- 7 MS. LAWSON: We can take the document down. Thank you.
- What was your position in 1999 and 2000? 8 Q.
- My position? Α. 9
- Q. Yes. 10
- Α. Zone commander. I continued to be a zone commander. 11
- Under what organisation in the year 2000? 12 Q.
- The Kosovo Liberation Army was transformed into the Kosovo 13
- 14 Protection Corps, and I continue to be a commander with the Kosovo
- Protection Corps. 15
- When did you leave the Kosovo Protection Corps? 16
- Α. In 2001. 17
- Since that time, have you ever worked for one of the accused in 18
- this case? 19
