5	PRESIDING JUDGE SMITH: Madam Court Officer, please call the
6	case.
7	THE COURT OFFICER: Good morning, Your Honours. This is case
8	KSC-BC-2020-06, The Specialist Prosecutor versus Hashim Thaci,
9	Kadri Veseli, Rexhep Selimi, and Jakup Krasniqi.
10	PRESIDING JUDGE SMITH: Thank you. And good morning, everyone.
11	For the record, the accused are all present in court.
12	Today, we will first resume and complete W04147's testimony,
13	and, thereafter, we will resume with W04739's testimony.
14	Madam Court Usher, please bring the witness into the courtroom.
15	And please stay in public session.
16	[Trial Panel confers]
17	[The witness takes the stand]
18	PRESIDING JUDGE SMITH: Good morning, Mr. Byrnes.
19	THE WITNESS: Good morning, Your Honour. I hope you and your
20	colleagues had a nice Easter weekend.
21	PRESIDING JUDGE SMITH: Thanks, you too. We hope you did, too.
22	Witness, today we will complete your testimony, hopefully within
23	the next one to two hours. I remind you to please try to answer the
24	questions clearly with short sentences. If you don't understand a
25	question, feel free to ask counsel to repeat the question or tell

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1	them you don't understand and they will clarify.
2	Also, please remember to try to indicate the basis of your
3	knowledge of the facts and circumstances upon which you will be
4	questioned.
5	I also remind you you are still under an obligation to tell the
6	truth as stated by you in your solemn declaration.
7	Please also remember to speak into the microphone and to wait
8	five seconds before answering a question and speak at a slow pace for
9	the interpreters to catch up.
10	If you feel the need to take a break, please let us know and we
11	will do our best to accommodate you.
12	Witness, we will first hear further questions from the Krasniqi
13	Defence. You can see that Mr. Ellis is standing.
14	Mr. Ellis, you have floor.
15	MR. ELLIS: Thank you, Your Honour.
16	WITNESS: SHAUN BYRNES [Resumed]
17	Further Cross-examination by Mr. Ellis: [Continued]
18	Q. Good morning, Witness.
19	A. Good morning, sir.
20	MR. ELLIS: Your Honours, could we move into private session for
21	the first series of questions due to the provider of the documents.
22	PRESIDING JUDGE SMITH: Yes. Into private session, please, for
23	provider's security.
24	[Private session]
25	[Private session text removed]

13	THE COURT OFFICER: Your Honours, we are now in open session.
14	MR. ELLIS: Thank you.
15	PRESIDING JUDGE SMITH: Go ahead, Mr. Ellis.
16	MR. ELLIS:
17	Q. I just have a couple of other shorter topics to deal with you,
18	Witness. The first is that His Honour Judge Mettraux asked you on
19	28 March at page 14004 in the transcript, line 18, whether you had
20	been made aware that Mr. Krasniqi, in addition to his role as
21	spokesperson, had been appointed as deputy commander for support
22	service within the General Staff. And your answer was:
23	"I was not."
24	It's right, isn't it, that in all your interactions with
25	Mr. Krasniqi he never held himself out as a deputy commander for

1 support services, did he?

2 A. No, he did not.

3 Q. Always as the spokesperson?

4 A. Yes. Yes.

Q. Were you aware at the time or later that Sokol Bashota was the
deputy commander and later deputy commander for operations, sir?
A. I was not aware of that at the time.

Q. Very well. Then His Honour Judge Barthe asked you on 27 March,
at page 13935 in the transcript, about paragraph 28 of your witness
statement, and I'll just read it back to you. It said:

"In September or November 1998, I brought up the issue of intra-Albanian killings and the killing of collaborators with the troika and they flatly denied that this took place."

Mr. Misetic asked you some questions about this on Thursday. And in response to him, you thought that this might relate to the alleged killing of Albanian Catholics in Gjakove. Do you recall that exchange?

18 A. I do.

Q. Now, we looked together at a cable from US KDOM dated 3 November 1998 which recorded that you had not seen Mr. Krasniqi or heard from him for some time. Do you recall seeing that cable?

22 A. Yes.

Q. And it's right, isn't it, that Sokol Bashota was your go-to contact or your primary contact, and you had extensive contact with him in this period?

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Witness: Shaun Byrnes (Resumed) (Open Session) Further Cross-examination by Mr. Ellis (Continued)

1 A. Yes.

Q. And you also sometimes had telephone contact with Rame Buja; correct?

4 A. Yes.

Q. So when you say in your statement that this issue was raised
with the troika in September or November 1998, it could be that you
spoke by telephone with Mr. Bashota or perhaps Mr. Buja, couldn't it?
A. The issue was intra-Albanian conflict?

9 Q. Yes, which you then clarified to Mr. Misetic related to the
10 Albanian Catholics in --

11 A. Right.

12 Q. -- Gjakove. That issue.

A. Would you mind, Mr. Ellis, would you mind repeating the questionthen? Thank you.

Q. Sure. The question was when you say that this issue was raised with the troika in September or November 1998, it could be that you spoke by telephone to Mr. Bashota or perhaps Mr. Buja, couldn't it? A. Yes, that's certainly possible.

Q. And, indeed, whenever your witness statement says something was raised with the troika, that could be via telephone call to one of them, couldn't it?

22 A. Yes.

23 Q. Thank you.

24 MR. ELLIS: Just a moment, Your Honours.

25 Q. And, sir, if you spoke to one of them on the telephone, you

1	wouldn't know if they communicated that to the others? You wouldn't
2	know if that happened behind the scenes?
3	A. Yes.
4	MR. ELLIS: Thank you, Your Honours.
5	PRESIDING JUDGE SMITH: Thank you, Mr. Ellis.
6	Mr. Emmerson, you have the floor.
7	Further Cross-examination by Mr. Emmerson:
8	Q. [Microphone not activated] can you remind us from your own
9	knowledge of the dates of the two sessions of Rambouillet, the first
10	and then the second?
11	Sorry, my question was can you remind us of the dates of the
12	first and the second Rambouillet assembly.
13	A. I'm sorry, I cannot do that off the top of my head.
14	Q. Well, we'll have those dates provided to you just in a moment or
15	two.
16	I want, if I may, to focus on two aspects of the Judges'
17	questions. The first is a question asked by Judge Barthe on 27 March
18	at page 13939, line 12. And Judge Barthe asked you this:
19	" Mr. Byrnes, just on a related issue, which is still not
20	completely clear to the Panel. Did you have any personal knowledge
21	at the time, that is in 1998 or 1999, about where Mr. Veseli was from
22	November 1998 onwards or what he was doing?"
23	To which you replied:
24	"The only sir, the only information that we had was that
25	Mr. Veseli was in Albania, and we did not know what his

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responsibilities were. There were rumours, but we didn't -- we had 1 no specific information that we could validate about what his 2 responsibilities were." 3 And then Judge Barthe clarifies, so apart from the rumours, you 4 didn't know what exactly he was doing in Albania, and you said that's 5 correct. 6 7 You remember that question and answer? I do. Α. 8 So the rumours as to what he was doing in Albania, did they Ο. 9 relate to rumours of liaison with the Albanian SHIK and with other 10 intelligence services? 11 I don't remember. 12 Α. You don't remember what the content of the rumours was? 13 Q. 14 Α. That's right. Thank you. Okay. We'll leave it at that then. Q. 15 But I do want, if I may, to ask you one or two questions about 16 the connection between those dates and the question and answer you 17 gave to Judge Barthe and the series of questions that were then asked 18 by Judge Mettraux about each of the instances of abduction and 19 release, from the Serb Tanjug journalists to the arrest of Cen Desku 20 and Jakup Kastrati, to the detention and then release of the Serb 21 prisoner of war Goran Zbilic and the release of the Tanjug 22 journalists in Dragobil, as well as the capture and release of the 23 eight VJ soldiers. 24

Now, just one moment.

Witness: Shaun Byrnes (Resumed) (Open Session) Further Cross-examination by Mr. Emmerson

1 MR. EMMERSON: Your Honour, the complete file of the passport 2 supplied by the Swiss authority recording Mr. Veseli's movements 3 during this period has been included in our queue as DKV1215 to 1234. 4 I don't propose, at this stage -- a version of this document has 5 already been admitted and given a D number. This is the file with 6 the covering documentation of authorisation from the Swiss 7 authorities who held the document and produced it.

I don't want to take up court time, unless anybody asks me to, 8 and go in through each individual stamp, because they're obviously 9 not in chronological order within the passport. But what I will do 10 is just to put the factual information relating to eight entries 11 spanning the period of 11 October 1998 down to 13 January 1999 and 12 summarise exactly what they say. We can, if necessary, point to the 13 14 individual stamps which support what I'm going to put to the witness. But I'm going to put that in relation to the chronology of the events 15 that Judge Mettraux questioned the witness about, if I may. 16

So if we could please -- I think probably the easiest way to do Ο. 17 this is to pinpoint the chronology which you were taken through more 18 than once about the dates of detention and arrest and the dates of 19 release of these individuals. And I'm going to put them in overall 20 chronological order, because as you would be aware, some people were 21 arrested after others and released before them, and there were 22 overlaps between detentions and so on. But if I could just give you 23 the dates that have emerged during your examination from documents 24 put to you and either confirmed from your own documentation or from 25

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1 other contemporaneous material.

2 So the first incident of note in time is 18 October 1998, which 3 was the date of the detention of the two Serb Tanjug journalists, 4 Nebojsa Radosevic and Vladimir Dobricic.

5 The next date of significance is 30 October, which is the date 6 of the detention of Cen Desku and Jakup Kastrati, the two LDK 7 officials that were arrested.

8 So following those two arrests, the next event of note is 9 17 November 1998 when the Serb policeman Goran Zbilic was arrested, 10 and he was, according to the records, released one week later on 11 24 November.

12 Three days after that, on 27 November, the Tanjug journalists 13 and the LDK officials were both -- or, rather, all released at the 14 same time on 27 November in Dragobil.

And then the arrest and release of the eight VJ soldiers occurred on 8 January 1999, that's the arrest, where they were captured near a KLA encampment in an area of Mitrovice, and I think you observed that it seemed as though they'd wandered -- lost their way and wandered into a KLA camp and been taken as prisoners of war, but were then released five days later on 13 January.

Now, with those dates in mind -- first of all, let me give you the record from the passport.

23 MR. EMMERSON: But before I do that, could we please bring up on 24 the screen a document we've seen a few times before, P652. Now, 25 there's an Albanian text as well. Thank you very much.

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This is a document that we've come to refer to as the FARK Ο. 1 agreement reached in Tirana between representatives of the armed 2 forces of the government-in-exile, the Bukoshi government, 3 represented by a man called Halil Bicaj, who you said -- I think it 4 wasn't a name you were familiar with, on the one hand, and by 5 Bislim Zyrapi, on the other, respectively assisted in the case of 6 7 Mr. Bicaj by Xhafer Jashari and in the case of Mr. Bislim Zyrapi by Kadri Veseli. And then there was one other representative of each 8 side present. 9

Now, first of all, we've had testimony that this agreement was reached in Tirana and that all participants were in Tirana at the time this agreement was negotiated and adopted.

And if you look at the very top of the page, you can see that it was adopted as the culmination of a series of meetings in Tirana but finally adopted on 31 October 1998 in the presence of the named individuals, including for our purposes Kadri Veseli. Can you see that?

18 A. I can.

Q. So as we know the detention of Cen Desku and Jakup Kastrati took place on the day before this document was signed during a period of time when all of the named people were engaged in joint meetings in Tirana.

23 MR. EMMERSON: I'm sorry, I can see Your Honour leaning forward. 24 PRESIDING JUDGE SMITH: I'm waiting for a question.

25 MR. EMMERSON: No, no, no, there is going to be a question. The

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1	ultimate question is does this information corroborate the witness's
2	answer to Judge Barthe that he is quite sure of one thing, which is
3	that although they didn't know what Mr. Veseli was doing
4	PRESIDING JUDGE SMITH: Now you're giving the answer. Just ask
5	the question to him.
6	MR. EMMERSON: Yes, I'm sorry, that's the question when I've
7	been through each of these comparisons.
8	PRESIDING JUDGE SMITH: Well, we've been ten minutes on this
9	MR. EMMERSON: Very well.
10	PRESIDING JUDGE SMITH: long pre
11	MR. EMMERSON:
12	Q. Would you accept well, the question can easily be put in this
13	way. I'll use the same formula that Judge Mettraux used when
14	questioning on these incidents.
15	Would you agree that if it's correct that there was a series of
16	meetings in Tirana culminating in the signing of this document by
17	Mr. Veseli and others on 31 October 1998, then he could not have been
18	present in Kosovo at the time of the arrest and detention of
19	Cen Desku and likely not at the time of the arrest of the two Tanjug
20	journalists either? Would you agree with that?
21	A. Yes.
22	Q. Thank you.
23	MR. FERDINANDUSSE: Your Honour, just for the record. We ask
24	that re-cross is limited in some manner, whether it is that counsel

is held to the time estimate he has previously given or whether that

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it's limited to new matters raised. These are two different ways to 1 limit re-cross, but it can't be that it's not limited in time and 2 that counsel gets free way to ask whatever question, no matter how 3 repetitive. This witness has stated at least five times that he does 4 not know where Mr. Veseli was already on cross-examination. 5 MR. EMMERSON: Well, he's now been shown a document in the same 6 7 manner that Judge Mettraux took him through documents he hadn't seen and asked him to compare the documents and draw conclusions. That's 8 exactly the method I'm using. 9 PRESIDING JUDGE SMITH: His testimony was clear the first time, 10 11 but go ahead. MR. EMMERSON: Well, his testimony was clear that he didn't know 12 what he was doing. But he's now seen a document which clarifies that 13 14 he can't have been in the country at the time of those arrests, if it's true on its face. 15 Now, the passport that we have in the evidence then picks the 0. 16 story up at that stage, and we have eight relevant date stamps. On 17 11 October 1998 is a stamp proving that he left by plane the airport 18 in Bern, Switzerland. And on the same date, a second stamp proving 19 that he entered Tirana airport, Rinas airport as it's known, on the 20 21 same day. So clearly -- if I can just ask you to clarify two things. 22 It.

would not have been possible for Mr. Veseli to fly out of Prishtine airport at any time between October 1998 and the end of the war. Do you agree with that?

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1 A. Yes.

Q. Thank you. So we can see that on 11 October he flew from Bern in Switzerland to Albania, and it must follow, mustn't it, that he was somewhere other than Kosovo or Albania or Switzerland when he began that journey?

6 A. Yes.

Q. So is that consistent with your understanding that he was outside Kosovo during the relevant period, even if you don't know what he was doing?

10 A. Yes.

Q. Thank you. Now, still in November, we have a stamp on 19 November showing that he left Tirana airport by plane going outwards. Now, there is no indication of an inbound arrival stamp in November. So you would agree with me, I imagine, that therefore having come in on 1 October, he has at some point left on 19 November.

Now, if we look at the second set of incidents. We've dealt 17 with the arrests of the journalists and the LDK officers. 18 17 November, being the next significant date, is the arrest of Goran 19 Zbilic, and 24 November is his release. So whatever the position was 20 at the time of his arrest, we can be sure that Mr. Veseli left the 21 country between the time -- left Albania going outwards at around the 22 same time and between the arrest and release; correct? 23 Yes. But a correction. I thought you said earlier that he 24 Α. 25 arrived in Tirana on 11 October, and you just said he'd arrived in

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1 Albania on 1 October.

2 Q. Sorry, I do apologise. If I said that, it's a slip of the 3 tongue.

4 A. But --

5 Q. He arrived in Albania from Switzerland on 11th --

6 A. 11th.

Q. -- of October, and then the next stamp in time is 19 October,
proving that he left Tirana at that stage once again.

9 A. And, again, to your actual question, the answer is yes.

Q. Thank you. Now, on 27 November, the Tanjug journalists and the LDK officials were released in Dragobil. And at that stage, since Mr. Veseli has left Tirana airport, the next entry in time shows him in Bern, in Switzerland, on 11 December, where he had his visa extended and left then Switzerland on that date, on 11 December. And he didn't return until 31 December to Tirana airport.

So would you agree with me that according to the stamps in his passport, he was not in the country nor even in Albania at the time of the arrangements for the release of the Tanjug journalists and the LDK officials Cen Desku and Jakup Kastrati?

20 A. It appears that's the case.

Q. Thank you. Now, let's move to January, because in January -there were three stamps in January. One of them is 5 January. So Mr. Veseli having left Tirana again on 31 December, the next stamp is a flight that arrives in Brussels, Belgium, on 5 January. And it's clear Mr. Veseli remained in Belgium between the 5th and 10th January

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1	because there's a stamp indicating that he left Brussels by plane on
2	10 January. So between the 5th and 10th January, he was in Brussels,
3	leaving on 10 January, and then, again, not clear where exactly the
4	journey took him in the first instance, but on 13 January, the
5	passport records him arriving in Fernetici, in Slovenia.
6	So we can be certain from those, would you agree, that
7	Mr. Veseli was not just out of the country but out of Albania and in
8	western Europe throughout the time that the officers had been the
9	VJ soldiers had been arrested and released?
10	A. Well, it's obvious we don't know where he was between 10 January
11	and 13 January, but I would agree it's unlikely that he was in
12	Albania.
13	Q. Well, he certainly wasn't in Kosovo.
14	A. Yes.
15	Q. But if we look at the dates, the arrest was 8 January, and he
16	was most definitely in Belgium then
17	A. Yes.
18	Q and the release was on 13 January, and he was in Fernetici,
19	in Slovenia then. So we can say with certainty he wasn't involved in
20	the events inside Kosovo in relation to the arrest or the release of
21	those officers. Would you agree with that?
22	A. I cannot because he may have been involved in the discussions
23	involving these matters by telephone.
24	Q. Yes, I'm sorry. He wasn't
25	A. But the basic

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1 Q. -- within Kosovo --

2 A. -- answer is I don't know.

Q. Very well. Very well. But you can confirm for me that on the dates we've seen, it appears that your understanding that he was outside of Kosovo was correctly founded?

6 A. Yes.

Q. I want to go in that context then, please, to a document that you were taken to on a number of occasions and you were taken to, I believe, also by Judge Mettraux, which is P303. Yes, you were questioned -- I'm sorry, I don't have the reference, but I don't think there will be any dispute about this.

12 So this is the document -- no, I'm sorry.

13 JUDGE METTRAUX: It's the next page, Mr. Emmerson.

MR. EMMERSON: Ah, exactly. I was going to say I think I have the wrong number, yes. The translation is the next page, 043862 at the bottom. Yes, there we have it. And I'm just checking, do we have it, the correct -- oh, it won't matter particularly because the witness is going to be following in the English version.

Q. And I just want to ask you about this because you can see that the second paragraph describes the arrest of the KLA -- I'm sorry, the two LDK officials, which took place on 30 October, the day before the document was being signed in Tirana making a collaboration with FARK. That was the date of the arrest. This document is published on 1 November, the following day.

25

And it's expressed in the second paragraph to be an allegation

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against these two individuals, essentially an allegation of
undermining the war effort and surrendering weapons in cooperation
with a named collaborator. But all of that information in the
language of whoever wrote this article that was published in the
newspaper, it's recorded as saying:
"According to the information of the KLA Intelligence
Service ..."

Now, when you were asked about this by Judge Mettraux at 13 -well, it's a passage beginning 13980, line 5, and running to 13981, line 18, and I'm looking at lines 3 to 18, where the passage of that paragraph was read to you up to the word "Kosovo" at the end of that central paragraph, and you were asked the question:

"Now, there were two references here to information having been received and provided by the KLA intelligence service. Is that consistent with what you said earlier, that you had indication already at the time," that's the beginning of November, "that an intelligence service was functioning within the KLA?"

18 And you said it is consistent with that understanding.19 A. Yes.

20 Q. And if I can just take it to the next passage in relation to 21 that. You were asked about information that you had about the 22 structure of the KLA, and this is Judge Barthe's question, 13937, 23 lines 7 to 17, and this time it's in reference to one of the 24 diplomatic telegrams, the November 1998 telegram, that there was an 25 information department, which is what was mentioned in the 1998

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1 telegram, the November 1998 telegram, but that you didn't know

2 exactly what its function was.

3 And this was the question:

"In paragraph 42 and the following, Mr. Byrnes, you made
observations on the KLA structure and the General Staff. And you,
among other things, said that the KLA had seven zones and a
General Staff, and that you believe that the KLA General Staff by
November 1998 was comprised of six departments; namely, political,
information, logistics, police, justice, and operations."

10

And Judge Barthe says:

"I would like to know now what do you mean or what did you mean when you said 'information'? So did you mean or do you mean intelligence or a department for public relations or a different thing?"

And you clarified that in that diplomatic telegram of 1998 at paragraph 42, what you had been telling Washington was that, in addition to political, logistics, police, justice, and operations, your understanding was that there was a public relations department. A. That's correct.

20 Q. So --

A. And at the time, I thought that at the time that public
relations department was, in fact, the information department.
Q. Yes. So I'm just going back then to the question Judge Mettraux
asked you about the passage in this document. Is that reference to
intelligence, he said, consistent with what you said earlier, that

you had an indication already that an intelligence service was 1 functioning within the KLA, that is, in November 1998. 2 Α. Yes. 3 Did you have information that there was any central intelligence 4 Ο. service functioning inside the KLA at a national or General Staff 5 level as long ago as November 1998? 6 7 Α. No, we did not. Thank you. You may have heard different terms being bandied 8 Q. around, ZKZ, and later, after the NATO bombing and as the 9 collaboration between NATO and the KLA got closer, they started using 10 NATO nomenclature, like J2, G2, and so forth, for military 11 intelligence units. But those two essentially were one and the same. 12 We've been told by a witness recently who was in a position to 13 14 know that the ZKZ and the G2 or J2 units, which came to be called that following NATO collaboration, are one and the same, and they 15 were operating not at a national level but at a local level. Whereas 16 SHIK, which you must have heard of as well, was announced on 2 April 17 18 following the establishment of the provisional government. Are you aware of that? 19 No, I'm not. Α. 20

Q. Did you know the distinction between the civilian SHIK as in the Department of Intelligence in the provisional government and those who were running around on the ground claiming some authority either as secret police or military police or, indeed, as intelligence? A. Sir, you're bandying around lots of terms. SHIK referred to the

1	Albanian national intelligence service. The Kosovo intelligence
2	service, which, as I understand, was established after the war,
3	perhaps earlier, was known as sorry, KSHIK, K and then SHIK. So
4	now I need to go ask you to repeat your question.
5	Q. Well, it may be that you answered it, in fact. You thought it
6	was after the war, but it was definitely part of the process of
7	establishing a civilian government as NATO had moved in and planned
8	for the stabilisation of Kosovo; correct?
9	A. That makes sense.
10	Q. And so it had to have a foreign ministry, it had to have a
11	Ministry of Defence, it had to have various entities for NATO to be
12	able to deal with the Kosovo Liberation Army. Do you agree?
13	A. That makes sense. Most governments have an intelligence
14	service.
15	Q. And, indeed, most governments have a foreign ministry and a
16	Ministry of Defence and so on, don't they? A Ministry for
17	Reconstruction, for example, in a period after a war?
18	A. Yes.
19	Q. And for NATO to be able to identify a point person for each of
20	these major tasks, someone had to take that role, didn't they?
21	A. Yes.
22	Q. And Mr. Veseli was appointed to SHIK in that process. Were you
23	aware of that?
24	A. No.

25 Q. Not at any time before the end of the war. Or before --

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Witness: Shaun Byrnes (Resumed) (Open Session) Further Cross-examination by Mr. Emmerson

1 A. Yes.

2 Q. -- June --

3 A. Not --

4 Q. -- I should say.

5 A. -- at any time before the end of the war.

Q. Because I noticed that in both your first and second diptels, which were on the -- well, the first is in December of the ones that we have. On 18 December, there's no reference there. But then as we move forward, the two that were published in March, both of them had no link between Mr. Veseli and the proposed intelligence service; is that correct?

12 A. Again, I'm confused.

13 Q. Well --

14 A. Please repeat --

15 Q. I'm sorry.

16 A. -- your question.

Q. 4 February 1999 is -- perhaps we can just bring it up for the sake of convenience.

And you went through, as you were asked at one stage, both in your evidence in chief and in the 8 questions that you were asked by Judge Mettraux on abductions and the 9 arrangements for release of each of those incidents - Qirez 10 delegation, the Tanjug journalists, the LDK officials, the Serb 11 policeman Goran Zbilic, the eight VJ soldiers, and the five elderly 12 Serb civilians - which senior KLA members -- you gave evidence of 13 14 which senior KLA members were either involved in the negotiations or close to them, and you've given various accounts at various times, 15 but -- and I'm not going to go through them in detail. But you 16 mentioned that Sokol Bashota was, for example, the go-to guy for 17 18 these types of situations, and so on.

You mentioned a number of members of the General Staff. You mentioned Sabit Geci, who was in an intelligence role, I think you would accept. And various other individuals had some role to play either in connection with detention or talking to the people involved in the detention or intercepted giving instructions or in some way or another involved in either the detention or the release --
